

**Church of Notre Dame Rectory**

The Rectory of Notre Dame is a handsome three-story building of gray brick and stone, designed as a modified version of a 16th century palazzo. It has a wide front facade, but comparatively little depth, in order to avail itself of the narrow area behind the church. The facade is divided into three horizontal divisions by string courses. The rounded corners of the building are a notable feature with windows set in them. The slightly projected central section of the building is outlined by quoins. In this section the handsome arched window extends through two stories. This central section rises for an additional half story and has a bulls-eye window, and is topped by a cross. A low parapet runs along the roof on either side.

Cross & Cross designed this building while they were doing plans for the enlargement of the church. Their choice of an Italian Renaissance style blends well with the classicism of the church.
